That's a good idea


Let's not focus on that anymore



All-Meeting Discussion on our Meeting's Values & Focus in a Troubled World

9 am Sunday 3 December 2023

Quaker Meeting is a unique spiritual experience, one of solitary contemplation and communal spiritual sharing. At times, we are called to come together to discern how we express our collective Quaker values. One format for such discernment is holding a **winnowing session**. Winnowing is the process of separating chaff from grain. We use this metaphor to describe our process of clearing away the extraneous from the important.

At this 3 December winnowing session we will discern as a group the essential values and focus of our Meeting as we move forward into the coming year. The current distresses in the world highlight an urgency for us to address in a spiritual, thoughtful, and collective manner our mission.

With deep listening, we will engage in **worship sharing**. We will consider queries in worshipful silence, and then speak aloud as led by Spirit to reflect our experiences, our feelings, and our piece of the Truth. We will allow space between speakers and refrain from speaking again until each person who wishes to speak has spoken.

A Leading/A Dream

Dear Friends,

I have a dream for our community. A dream for our Meeting.



We all know that in the months to come there will be increasing violence, confrontation, anger and fear in our world. In my dream, Quakers are a nonviolent peace force. Quakers are the ones who stand in protection around those who are being threatened: Muslims, Jews, people of color, LGBTQ folks, undocumented people, "dissidents," and so on. The threats may come from any fearful, angry group of people or from armed police or military personnel.

My personal experiences of standing, simply standing peacefully, in protection of others, include standing at the California-Mexican border to help decrease Border Patrol violence; standing with other Witness for Peace volunteers on the Nicaragua-Honduras border during the Contra war; standing around a mosque after 9-11 so worshippers could safely enter and leave; and standing in a circle around the home of a fellow war tax resister which was about to be seized by the IRS. In every case, the presence of people simply standing peacefully did decrease the violence.

I think Quakers are the very people who should be among those standing, witnessing, being a calming presence. Ideally, we would be trained (or refreshed) in nonviolent civilian protection. I have obtained a list of trainers in Oregon who specialize in nonviolent action and presence. I would like this to be part of our Meeting's mission and community service. It would also increase our visibility, if we wore simple armbands or t-shirts identifying the Quaker Peacekeepers.

Thank you for considering my dream.



2023.11.1 Friends approved as presented the Minutes from the 15 October Meeting for Worship for Business.

Treasurer's Report: There were some snafus in where money has been deposited, which Adam is fixing. The money in Special Projects on this month's statement will be transferred to Operations. Black Alliance for Social Empowerment (BASE) reparations have been stopped unintentionally, and Adam is setting those up again. Related to budget, F&H members have begun submitting receipts rather than all donations being in kind. Friends were in agreement that members of the committee should indeed submit receipts, and we will respond with the budget as needed.

Ministry & Counsel (M&C): M&C has been rotating clerks but has decided to have a single clerk. Bob Morse will be the clerk for M&C through June, at which point clerkship will be revisited.

Sunday 3 Dec at First Hour will be a winnowing session for our Meeting's focus and values as we move into the next year. *Details on Page 3.*

M&C is responding to a leading from within our meeting to reinvigorate peaceful Quaker Witness. An ad-hoc interest group has been formed. If you are interested in participating, please contact Becky or anyone on M&C. Details on Page 4.

Joint Committee (JC): JC would like to add the Clerk of Buildings and Grounds as a full member of JC. Action will need to be taken by the Meeting to accomplish this. Finances are in great shape. The balances are coming back up; rentals are coming up.

Currently, the petty cash payments include utility bill payments. Recently, we raised the petty cash cap due to increasing utility payments. It was proposed to tie the petty cash cap to our monthly contribution so that the cap keeps pace with inflation. We are currently contributing \$700 per organization (\$1400 total), so the proposal would raise the petty cash cap to that \$1400 limit. Friends suggested that utilities be removed from the petty cash cap altogether. Friends also wondered if there were two different situations/accounts needed: one petty cash, and a separate for capital replacement/repairs (e.g., furnace replacement, dishwasher replacement). JC will take these up.

Peace & Social Concerns: Friends had a session last month regarding how we move forward on Christian Nationalism. What came out of that meeting was a feeling that we should find out where other faith-based groups are with regard to Christian Nationalism to engage in learning and communicating together. The committee read a letter in hopes to sending out to local faith-based organizations. Friends discussed the scope of our outreach; the sense of the Meeting was Jackson County. The cost of this endeavor was discussed and will be absorbed within the Peace and Social Concerns budget.

2023.11.02 The Meeting approved sending the letter on Christian Nationalism to other faith communities in Jackson County, the cost being born by the Peace and Social Concerns Committee.

Friendship & Hospitality (F&H): Greeter spots are all filled. F&H is planning a gathering of Greeters to get on the same page. 10 December is the next Soul Food Sunday.

Starting in 2024, Soul Food Sundays will be quarterly and may include some outdoor fellowship and be seasonally themed.

New Year's Watch

9 am Sunday 31 December

In the early years of South Mountain Friends Meeting, we had a tradition of gathering on New Year's Eve for what we called New Year's Watch. Beginning at 9 pm with light snacks and conversation, the Watch would switch around 10 pm to worship sharing on what



Spirit had led us to, individually and as a meeting, during the previous year—and what we expected the new year to bring. Worship sharing would slide into silent worship around 11:30, which would last until shortly after the new year had arrived; then there would be more snacks and more conversation before we dispersed, with filled and quieted souls, between 12:30 and 1 am.

At the beginning, in the 1970s, we met in Friends' homes. But over the years as one after another home became unavailable, the New Year's Watch became homeless. We tried holding it in the Meeting House for a few years, but attendance dwindled; The last gathering was held around 2005, and consisted only of Melody, me, and a couple who had driven down from Roseburg for the occasion. Since then, the Watch has been dormant, but not dead: the worship sharing portion has been revived several times, as a First Hour activity on years that either New Year's Eve or New Year's Day has fallen on a Sunday.

This year is one of those. Please join us **9** in the morning of New Year's Eve day (Sun 31 Dec) as we address the following queries, which are based on an old, old Quaker greeting (Truth and Spirit being essentially synonymous for early Friends):

- How has Truth fared with thee during the past year? And,
- How does thee expect Truth to fare in the year that is about to arrive?

New Year's Watch will be hybrid, but Friends are encouraged to attend in person for the fellowship, and then worship, which will follow. —Bill Ashworth
